Re: Review Committee File #1290

Union hereby withdraws the above captioned case from the active files of the Review Committee, without prejudice to the positions of either Company or Union.

Union is withdrawing this grievance as there appears to be a number of peripheral issues contained in this case which could divert attention from the matter which is of central concern to the Union.

That is, we perceive a growing tendency on Company's part, manifest in this case and in others presently pending in the grievance procedure, to transgress statutory and contractual rights of employees in the name of security. We feel that the action of Pacific Gas and Electric Company security personnel in making what we consider unfounded, hysterical statements concerning the activities and attitudes of Rowan, Darington and others to police authorities was irresponsible at best and, at worst, dangerously destructive of constitutional, statutory and contractual rights. This intemperate abuse of employee rights cannot be dismissed merely as an isolated instance. It appears, instead, to be a growing problem, and will continue to grow as Pacific Gas and Electric Company converts to nuclear or other potentially sensitive sources of power.

We understand that certain security measures may become inevitable, but they must be mutually arrived at and circumscribed to assure that only legitimate security objectives are attained with minimum elimination of employee rights. L. V. Brown

Unilateral Company actions such as that contained in the grievance here withdrawn and exemplified by the recent unilateral imposition of searches upon employees of the Diablo Canyon Power Plant are intolerable and shall be resisted.
