
Vote in Your Union Election . . .

The machinery of free collective bargaining is in motion between Local 1245 and the Pacific Gas and Electric Company. This operation is the number one responsibility of the writer at this time and other items must take a back seat until a successful conclusion is reached over the bargaining table which is deemed satisfactory by those who will vote on the ratification of tentative settlements.

What is done here, will be of great importance to our members, their families, the stockholders, the consumers and the general public.

The Union's Committee and the Company's Committee must wrestle with a multitude of problems which involve millions of dollars.

Coincidental with this operation, other utility bargaining is going on and we are keeping in close touch wth the picture as we sharpen up our research and get down to brass tacks at the bargaining table.

AT THE 9TH DISTRICT Progress Meeting of the I.B.E.W., held on May 14 through May 17, we had an opportunity to check with utility local delegates from California, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, Alaska and Hawaii concerning their settlements and experiences in bargaining.

We find that while some wage patterns are shaping up, the rest of the usual issues involving conditions and benefits, are not

Gentlemen:

The expiration of the current term of both the physical and clerical Agreements on June 30, 1962, will mark the end of a two year period during which Contract provisions other than wages have been applicable without change. Throughout this period, the desired stability in the working relationship contemplated by Company and Union in the 1960 negotiations has existed. At this time however, in accordance with the provisions of Sections 500.2 and 24.2(a) of the respective Agreements, the Company has several constructive amendments to Contract provisions to consider as a basis for negotiations. Each of these amendments in Company's opinion relates to improvement in Contract administration and application which will bring beneficial results to employees. The Company's proposals are attached.

Considering the overall bargaining outlook this year, it is hoped that bargaining will be resolved on a give and take basis. The Company is interested in improvements which will provide better and more flexible working arrangements. Basic criteria for considering a general wage increase will, no doubt, be explored in our meetings.

Aside from the attached proposals, the Company will, as in the past, submit counters to Union's proposals where deemed advisable. Also, the Company may propose some changes in specific classification wage rates.

We shall be pleased to commence negotiations with the Bargaining Committee of Local 1245 and shall enter into the process with the desire and expectation that the combined efforts of Union and Company will culminate in a mutually satisfactory settlement.

WAGE RAISE, OTHER GAINS IN NEW SIERRA PAC AGREEM

A two-year Agreement providing for general wage adjustments of from 13c to 35c per hour has been signed between Local 1245 and the Sierra Pacific Power Company in Nevada. The pact calls for a wage adjustment May 1, 1962 with a second adjustment, mid-term of the two-year period. Various Contract and fringe improvements were made along with the wage adjustment. 1962 physical wage schedules will be adjusted by the following formula:

Amend to read: In the event of the discipline, demotion, or discharge of a regular employee, Company shall, at Union's request, state in writing the reason therefor. (See also Section 210.2.)

TITLE 108. SUPPLEMENTAL BENEFITS FOR INDUSTRIAL INJURY

Section 108.1

Amend to read: When an employee is absent for reason of injury in the scope of his employment with Company which comes within the application of the Workmen's Compensation and Insurance Chapters of the State Labor Code, he shall be eligible for supplemental benefits for the duration of temporary disability. (The remainder of the Section is unchanged.)

TITLE 202. HOURS

Section 202.19

Add a second sentence to read as follows: Employees who do not reside at a temporary headquarters as provided in Section 201.1 but who report for work at a designated temporary headquarters shall be compensated for travel time between their homes and such temporary headquarters to which they report provided, however, that compensation for such travel time shall Section 302.10 not exceed that which would otherwise be applicable for traveling between their regular headquarters and such designated temporary headquarters.

TITLE 205. JOB BIDDING AND PROMOTION Section 205.10

Amend second sentence to read: Such preferential consideration shall not be given over an otherwise successful bid from an employee who has greater department seniority than the employee veteran.

Section 205.14

Redesignate the present Section as Subsection 205.14(a) and add a new Subsection (b) as follows:

(b) In determining the ability and personal qualifications of employees whose bids have been submitted to fill vacancies in jobs in which employees must perform supervisory duties, consideration shall be given to the following:

1. The employee's personal qualifications of leadership and supervisory ability.

2. The employee's ability to cooperate with associates in the programming of his work,

3. The employee's ability to do the work.

4. The employee's knowledge as measured by Company and Union approved tests.

TITLE 206. DEMOTION AND LAY-OFF PROCEDURE Section 206.10

Renumber Subsection 206.10(a) as 206.10 and delete Subsection 206.10(b).

After Section 206.14 add the following: Demotion Other Than

The foregoing Sections 206.1 through 206.14 do not apply to an employee demoted because of inability to perform the duties of his job or for disciplinary reasons. Demotion under such circumstances are provided for as follows:

206.15. An employee who is demoted for inability to perform the duties of his job may be placed in a vacancy created in his classsification require improvement. Company proposes to discuss headquarters by the promotion of one or more employees to fill the job which the demoted employee vacated. If no such vacancy occurs he may be demoted to a vacancy in a lower classification in the Division in which he is employed. In the application of this Section an employee shall be demoted to a vacancy in the first successively lower classification which he is qualified to fill.

206.16. An employee who is demoted for disciplinary reasons may be placed in any vacancy in a lower classification in the Division which he is qualified to fill.

206.17. A supervisory or other employee who was not at the time of demotion a member of the collective bargaining unit may be demoted for any reason other than for lack of work into a previously existing vacancy in such unit within the Division in which he is employed or into a vacancy which has been created in any Division by the concurrent transfer or promotion of an employee out of such unit in connection with such demotion.

TITLE 207. MISCELLANEOUS

Add a new Section 207.7 to read as follows: To temporarily replace an employee who is on authorized absence from his job for Union activity, Company may adjust the basic workweek and the hours of work of another employee. Company shall not be required to pay overtime compensation by reason of such adjustment provided that such other employee does not work more than than eight (8) hours in any work day.

TITLE 208. OVERTIME

Section 208.16

Amend to read: Prearranged overtime shall be distributed among employees in the same classification and in the same loca tion as equally as is practicable.

TITLE 210. STATUS OF EMPLOYEES

Section 210.2

Amend by adding the following: The termination of employ ment of a probationary employee shall not be subject to the grievance procedure.

(c) A change from a present headquarters or point of assembly in a rural area to a location that is at such a distance from the previous loction as to cause an employee normally to move his place of abode.

TITLE 302. HOURS

Amend to read as follows: When regular employees are engaged in work other than that described in Section 302.9 hereof, a point of assembly shall be designated for each job in an area where room and board is normally available, and time spent by such employees in traveling between such points of assembly and work sites shall be considered as time worked, provided, however, that the foregoing shall not apply when any such job is in a town or metropolitan area, or is a station or hydro job where living quarters are provided by Company. An area where room and board is normally available shall mean the area of an incorporated city or town and the zone extending two radial miles beyond the city limits, or to any other location where an eating place and lodgings are available in the vicinity of the point of assembly. When such employees travel between living quarters provided by Company and the work site such travel time in excess of 15 minutes each way is considered time worked. If the work site is inaccessible to automotive transportation, such travel time shall be to a designated nearby point which is accessible.

EXHIBIT VIII

Amend by adding the following classifications: GENERAL CONSTRUCTION DIVISIONS

Field Clerk, First Foreman's Clerk

Field Clerk, Routine Assistant Foreman's Clerk Amend the statement at the end of the Exhibit by adding the following: An employee in a General Construction classification who bids on an apprentice classification or a classification higher thereto in a normal line of progression in a Division must have passed the appropriate apprentice entrance tests before his bid will be considered under Section 205.7. Such an employee who bids on any other classification in a Division must have passed 'Wonderlic Personnel Test" before his bid will be considered under Section 205.7.

Section 9.6

Amend to read as follows: The initial step in the adjustment of a grievance shall be a discussion between the Union's Shop Steward and the immediate supervisor directly involved. The supervisor and the Shop Steward, together with a Union representative and a representative of the Division Personnel Department, may discuss the grievance with the next higher ranking supervisor in charge. (The remainder of the Section is unchanged.) Section 9.13

Amend to read: In the event of the discipline, demotion, or discharge of a regular employee, Company shall, at Union request, state in writing the reason therefor. (See also Section 21.2.)

TITLE 13. WAGES

Section 13.3

Amend Subsection 13.3(a) to read as follows: If such temporary work is in a higher classification having a wage range he shall be paid the minimum wage rate of such classification or his regular wage rate plus two and one-half percent (21/2%), whichforty (40) hours in any workweek involved in the change or more ever is the greater, during the period of such temporary assignment.. In no event shall he be paid a wage rate which is higher than the maximum wage rate of the higher classification to which he is temporarily assigned. If such assignment is for less than five (5) consecutive work days, he shall be paid therefor at his regular wage rate.

TITLE 21. STATUS OF EMPLOYEES

Section 21.2

changing much due to the fact that most West Coast utilities are open for wages only this year.

Therefore, our bargaining taks the spotlight and the basic issues we are talking about this year command the attention of the entire industry due to the size and importance of the employer and the Union in this field.

While the negotiations with PG&E take number one priority, we are also pushing our organizing efforts with some success. Special efforts are being made in General Construction and Bay Area Clerical and we see that many Stewards are sending in applications from all Divisions, even those which are already almost 100 per cent organized.

THESE EFFORTS are of great assistance to the Negotiating Committee and must be intensifield during the bargaining sea-

Negotiations are also in progress with Standard Pacific Gas Line Inc. and Pacific Gas Transmission, subsidiaries of PG&E. The Contract dates of PG&E Clerical, PG&E Physical, Stan-Pac and PGT are expected to remain equal so that we bargain these four Contracts together.

Interest appears high this year among the employees of these four groups, with Pacific Gas Transmission people looking forward to their first complete Contract.

INTERCHANGE possibilities among these four groups are of interest. This interest concerns the matter of job security through wider job_opportunities. Being under one house has its advantages and Local 1245 will seek to bring those advantages to the largest possible number of people.

It is hoped that as the Committees do their job, the people for whom they work will maintain the interest and support needed to deliver a maximum result from a difficult under-

1962 will be a significant year in the history of Local 1245 and when it is written, let us hope that the chapter on how many people participated and voted in the ratifications will show the greatest gain of all.

By action of the Local Union Executive Board, the Election Committee was instructed to utilize the following provisions of the International Constitution.

Article XXVII, Section 2 (16) (A)

'Notwithstanding the above, and in addition to the sample ballot, a L. U. may distribute an official publication which shall list all candidates for L. U. office, together with a factual record of activities within the L. U., committee assignments performed, offices held and experience gained for and in behalf of the L.U. This publication shall be prepared under the supervision of the duly designated L. U. Election Committee.

In accordance with the foregoing, each candidate was notified to complete a questionnaire and return it, together with a photograph, suitable for publication, to the Election Committee. They were further notified that this completed questionnaire and/or photograph had to be in the Post Office Box by 10:00 a.m. on May 9, 1960, or the Election Committee would be unable to include the information requested in the May issue of the "Utility Reporter."

Economic A-Power At Bodega Plant Forecast by PG&E

Pacific Gas and Electric Company recently showed how it believes commercially competitive electric power can be generated with atomic energy in the Aplant the Company plans at Bodega Bay in Sonoma County.

Detailed cost estimates, indicating that atomic energy will be economical for power production in California after completion of the plant late in 1965, were presented at a hearing before the California Public Utilities Commission in San Fran-

The figures showed that the 325,000-kilowatt station will produce electricity for 5.5 mills (55/10ths of a cent) per kilowatthour if kept in operation 90 per cent of the time. PG&E believes the 90 per cent as-sumption—called "capacity factor"-is reasonable.

J. D. Worthington, PG&E Chief Civil Engineer, testified that even if the capacity factor were reduced to 80 per cent, electricity would cost only six mills per kilowatthour to generate with atomic fuel at Bodega Bay.

Worthington presented studies to the Commission indicating that a plant of identical size at Bodega Bay, but using oil for fuel, would produce electricity for 5.9 mills per kilowatthour operated 90 per cent of the time, and 6.3 mills operated 80 per cent of the time.

The electric power cost estimates presented by PG&E witnesses to the California Commission today are the lowest ever forecast for a nuclear-fueled plant in the United States.

Worthington told the Commission that PG&E is prepared to invest \$61 million in the plant, exclusive of related electric transmission facilities. The Company's application asks the Commission to issue a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the project.

Willard H. Nutting, a Senior Mechanical Engineer for PG&E, described the boiling water reactor proposed for installation in the Bodega plant. He also outlined previous experience of PG&E engineers in the design and construction of three similar plants, and discussed procedures and policies adopted to make safe the use of nuclear



Why must we wait for a crisis before we become active and participate in the functioning of our democracy? Why must we wait until its very life is threatened? Can we not defend it day-in and day-out by being active, responsible, thinking voters?

The defense of democracy should not be on a panic basis. It is best defended by being practiced.

Neither should we be confused about what is the contribution of our way of life. We shall not be remembered for our materialism (which, unfortunately, we probably practice all too well). We shall, we hope, be remembered for the development of democratic structures and institutions. Let it not be said that these democratic institutions went down the drain because the electorate would not rouse itself to protect the processes of free government.

The time—June—is now. There is a motto—"Tuum Est." It has two translations—"It is yours" and "It is up to you."



Wise Words for Unions From Lt. Gov. Anderson

Lieutenant Governor Glenn M. Anderson, unanimously endorsed by the State AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education (COPE), is a true friend of organized labor,

The following is a statement he made at the recent convention of the State Council of Carpenters:

In my opinion virtually all of the gains which have been made by organized labor in the past century—the higher wages and shorter hours you enjoy; the greater degree of security and above all the respect and dignity which the American working man rightfully commands today-all of these things rest upon

"One of these is the right to bargain collectively and, if necessary, to strike. Centuries of experience tell us that the individual workman cannot rely completely upon the native generosity and kindness of his employer for fair treatment, There must be economic teeth in his demands, to match the economic power of employers. Your union is the instrument of

But, perhaps even more important in the long run, is your right to vote. Without power at the ballot box, the strength you bring to the bargaining table can be so cramped, regulated, and confined as to make it practically worthless. For a good many years in this country the Republican Party served as an instrument of the employing group. Republican judges regularly issued injunctions against strikes; Republican legislators turned a deaf ear to labor's efforts to win legal recognition of the collective bargaining process. And when these were not enough Republican presidents used the army to break strikes.

A reopening of the Agreement for negotiating improvements and/or changes in the benefit program was provided for no later than eleven months after the date of the new Agreement (May 1, 1962).

Committee members Clarice Jensen, Orville Owen and Robert Newberry presented details of the proposals to a ratification meeting held in Reno April 23, 1962. Membership approval was voted by secret ballot and the new Agreement has been signed by Business Manager Ronald T. Weakley and President J. E. Gibbs, Jr. Wage increase will be reflected in the first pay checks in May

Business Manager Weakley, who headed the bargaining committee, recommended acceptance by the membership, stating, "This offer, with the stability of a two-year agreement, should go well along the road to firming up the Company's ability to expand and will improve the job security as well as the economic position of our members in the Sierra Pacific Power Company. The longer term with a re-opener clause will provide a means for improving the benefit program which we have known should be reviewed but could not fit into the bargaining picture with a one-year agreement."

It was felt that inasmuch as many of these items have been raised as grievance matters or through other discussions between Union and Company in the period since our last Contract negotiating sessions of 1960 and remain unresolved, informal discussions on these matters during bargaining this year might lead to clarification of positions by the parties and possible agreement on methods for making disposition of them. It is our intent to make specific proposals on these matters dependent upon results of our discussions. While these issues will take time to resolve, it is felt greater flexibility of solution is afforded by open discussion than by making specific proposals

We would appreciate hearing from you at your earliest convenience in order that a mutually satisfactory calendar for negotiations can be developed.



Safety Roundup

SAFETY PROBLEM ACTIVITIES STEPPED UP

The increased interest of members concerning job safety problems has resulted in the processing of some two dozen inquiries since the safety program was expanded last March. These have ranged from a flea problem, through radiation exposure criteria, to a recent needless electrical fatality.

HUMBOLDT MEETING

On April 28th a meeting was held at Eureka with members who will work as operators and technicians at the first PG&E nuclear power plant. Business Manager R. T. Weakley, Assistant Bus. Mgr. L. L. Mitchell, and Bus. Rep. J. McMullan were also in attendance. The subject matter dealt with the unique safety problems associated with manning a nuclear power generation plant. The high caliber personnel attending this meeting should help insure the success of California's first utility-owned atomic plant.

HAYWARD MEETING

DIAGONAL SAFETY BELTS?

A safety belt concept gaining wide acceptance in Sweden and other European countries involves the use of a diagonal safety belt for automobiles. The belt passes over one shoulder, across the chest, and down past out fear of contamination. the hip to a floorboard mounting. The aircraft-type fastener is located at about one's midsection. More and more of these particle accelerators are finding their place in industrial, medical, and educa-tional applications. Today they pose a considerable threat to radioisotopes as sources of radiation. These machines are constantly being improved to get deeper penetration, and more power per kilowatt



belts. Head and back injuries PROS AND CONS OF MULTIPLE HEALTH INSURANCE

Many people believe it is in their best interests to hold several group health insurance policies. Following is a short discussion on the subject which may assist some of you in arriving at a

"The Health Insurance Council reviewed the problem of overinsurance through duplication of benefits," so reports the Employee Benefit Plan Review. It says that the great growth of voluntary health insurance has resulted in an increasing number of insured workers who have more than one form of health insurance protection against the hazards of loss of time, as well as hospital and medical care expenses resulting from illness or accidental injury. There is also the case where certain individuals have sevtral hospital and medical care plans that cover the same illnesses.

Multiple coverage is sometimes used as a means of strengthenbe produced by changing the ing an individual's insurance program which would otherwise be inadequate, and, in such instances, it operates to the public's adthe nucleus of any atom. This vantage. However, the converse is true when multiple policies can be done by bombarding the produce larger benefits than the insured's expenses or loss of income

CONTRARY TO PUBLIC INTEREST

Over-insurance furnishes the insured individual with a "profit" incentive which is contrary to public interest in that it distorts the function of the insurance mechanism and violates incurance

1. Unnecessarily increasing premiums, due to its effect on claim frequency and costs

or luxury services and care.

3. Encouraging patient demands on the practicing physician for unnecessary hospital confinements and unjustified prolonged hospital stays.

4. Destroying the individual's incentive to return to work, thereby adversely affecting the constructive influence of rehabilitation services and ultimately impairing the individual's productivity.

5. Complicating the hospital credit and collection practices in insured confinements in those instances where multiple coverage results in the submission of multiple claim forms and over-payment of the hospital bill through the use of assignments

6. Frequently providing greater benefits for procedures than are customarily charged by the physician or surgeon.

7. Diverting premium resources to purchase excess coverage when such resources might be used more effectively and economically to fill other needs in the insured's over-all insurance program or other necessary living expenses.

Many group major medical plans are now using "non-duplication policy provisions and the insurers are making other efforts to develop such information.

In other words, the insurance companies are starting to take steps to prorate benefits in the event that you have duplicating

It may well be that in the future all group insurance plans will be so written that it is not possible to collect from more than one 2. Encouraging the insured patient to demand unnecessary plan. Some of the reasons cited above may be the "handwriling on the wall for future policies.

A majority of the employees of the Electric Division of the City of Palo Alto have signed applications for membership in Local 1245, thus requesting the Union to represent them with respect to their employment relationships with their employer.

These rights were gained during the 1961 Session of the California State Legislature, at which time Local 1245 played an important role in securing passage of the legislation involved.
