'Women in the Trades' PG&E women organize for mutual support

omen in job classifications traditionally held by men face a twin challenge: mastering skills and changing attitudes.

Mastering the skills is the easy part. Women at PG&E have proved they can perform the work of gas fitter, gas crew foreman, electric lineman and other "physical" classifications.

But gaining acceptance from their co-workers in the field--and getting support from management-has been another story.

A group of Local 1245 women in the East Bay has responded to the problem in a time-honored way: they're getting organized.


Union plans to escalate Arbor Tree campaign

ickets will go up in Placerville this month as Local 1245 intensifies its campaign to win a contract with Arbor Tree Surgery Co.


With an on-going picketline firmly established at Arbor Tree headquarters in Auburn, the union's decision to expand the picketing provides fresh evidence of the union's determination to prevail in its four-year fight with the non-union contractor.

At a meeting with union negotiators in Auburn on Nov. 16, Arbor officials provided no substantial new proposals, according to Local 1245 Business Representative Jack Osburn.

Native Solidarity: Current box office hit "Last of the Mohicans" became a union picture halfway through production when workers organized a strike in the middle of a location shoot. The producers had refused to bargain with the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE), but changed their minds when 100 Native American extras led by cast member Russell Means joined the picket line.

Murder in El Salvador: Despite a peace accord

signed in January, right-wing attacks on trade unionists in El Salvador continue. According to Free Labour World, trade union leaders Miguel Angel Alvarenga and Salvador Ivan Ramirez were murdered in July after receiving death threats from the FAS Anti-Communist Front.

States could reduce the unemployment rate by one percentage point at the bottom of recessions if they required employers to pay the full cost of jobless benefits for temporarily laid-off workers, according to the National Bureau of Economic Research.

Activist on Trial: Trade union activist Chakufwa Chihana of the African nation of Malawi has been awarded the 1992 winner of the Robert F. Kennedy Human Rights Award. The Malawi government is currently trying Chihana for "sedition" because of his efforts to win democratic rights for the people of Malawi.

Respect Workers' Rights: Chinese labor activist Han Dongfang, recently released from prison in China, called on the Chinese government to respect its own laws and treaties guaranteeing basic human and labor rights. He warned that recent moves in China toward a market economy could

leave workers vulnerable to exploitation unless they are permitted to organize unions. **Pay Equity:** Pay equity legislation mandating equal pay for jobs requiring similar skills and responsibilities would be supported by 77% of registered voters, according to a nationwide poll. The National Committee on Pay Equity says that white women currently earn only 69 cents for every dollar a white man makes, while African-American and Hispanic women earn 62 cents and 54 cents respectively of the white man's dollar. The figure is 73 cents for African-American men and 66 cents for Hispanic men.

The life insurance benefit is offered in connection with the AFL-CIO Union Privilege program, which offers a wide range of benefits to union members to help them stretch their hard-earned paychecks.

The Basic Insurance Plan offers coverage up to \$100,000 to qualifying members. Members who do not qualify for the Basic Insurance Plan will be offered guaranteed protection under the Guaranteed Benefit Plan, which grows to \$10,000 in coverage over 10 years.

The program provides for a waiver of premium payments during layoffs, lockouts, or union-sanctioned strikes of 30 days or more.

Keeping a close eye on EMF-cancer connection

Evidence continues to accumulate linking exposure to electric and magnetic fields with cancer.

This fall Sweden's National Board for Industrial and Technical Development announced that from now on it "will act on the assumption that there is a connection between exposure to power frequency magnetic fields and cancer, in particular childhood cancer." This action was prompted by two major studies undertaken by the Swedish government-one of residential exposure and the other of occupational exposure.

Some recent studies have failed to find a significant connection between EMF exposure and cancer, so we cannot yet say what the precise connection is or what the consequences are for workers who are exposed.

But the Swedish studies make it clear that we must proceed with caution.

The Swedish residential study found that children exposed to average fields of 3 milligauss or more in their homes had close to four times the expected rate of leukemia. The occupational study showed that men exposed to similar levels of magnetic fields at work had three times the expected incidence of chronic lymphocytic leukemia.

As a result of these studies, the Swedish National Board for Industrial and Technical Development will soon begin work on EMF exposure regulations for new homes near power lines and for all new electrical facilities.

There are on-going efforts in our own country to inform the public about EMF.

The California Public Utilities Commission



(PUC) commissioned a consensus group last year to come up with policy recommendations concerning EMF exposure.

Local 1245 was among the groups participating in this commission, which met between November 1991 and March 1992.

This month we will join with these groups in offering testimony to an administrative law judge of the Public Utilities Commission. Each group will have its own particular focus. Our union's focus will be on workers.

We will urge that every effort should be made to educate workers about the known facts concerning EMF exposure.

We will also testify that unions like ours should have meaningful opportunities to provide input into policies that govern work around EMF fields.

The reason our members should have input is pretty simple: they are the ones at risk. Moreover, our members will be a valuable source of knowledge and experience when its comes to figuring out ways to reduce EMF exposure.

Local 1245 has worked jointly with PG&E to inform employees about the latest research concerning EMF. We will continue our efforts to make sure that our members are among the first to know when new information about EMF becomes available.

PG&E 'Women in the Trades' organize for mutual support

is still only vaguely defined, there's nothing vague about what they want to accomplish: mutual support in addressing workplace problems faced by women in the trades, and expanded opportunities for women within the company.

"This company is so vast there are many women working out there who don't have anybody they can speak to," said Karen Stroud, a groundperson.

In some cases, there may be only one woman at a particular location who is working in a physical classification and "she's getting the brunt of everything," said Stroud.

workers.

Kris Hardie, an apprentice electronics metering tech, said her interest in Women in the Trades grew out of some unpleasant experiences working in the field.

"I did all kinds of things to get out of that job," said Hardie. She views Women in the Trades as a source of "empowerment and support for women" and a way of actually doing something about the problems that women encounter on the job.

The idea of PG&E women organizing for mutual support has been around for several years. According to Karen Wasiolek, a gas serviceperson, a conference at Mills College in the mid-1980s prompted interest in some kind of women's support group at PG&E.

However, the women say the company showed little support for their efforts. As a result, no formal, on-going group emerged at that time. But Wasiolek thinks that

the company's attitude is changing.

"Previously [PG&E] never took any steps that really mattered-such as hiring more women and keeping them here," said Wasiolek. "Now, finally, officially, the company is going to acknowledge there are women in the

company and they're going to recognize them."

The East Bay women credit Todd Sousa, a PG&E Employee Involvement facilitator, with helping revive the group this year.

Hotline in the Works

So far, WIT has largely been a place to exchange ideas and hopes for the future. But those hopes may soon be translated into something concrete if the women succeed in establishing a "Hotline" for women at PG&E.

The women believe a Hotline could provide a way to announce events of interest to women, to hook women up with training and job opportunities, and to inform women of trends within the company of interest to women.

A Hotline could also serve to link together individual women who feel isolated out in the field and give them a sense of solidarity with other women in physical classifications and with PG&E women in general.

To Sara Willis, a gas serviceperson, the Hotline represents the beginning of action on problems that management has previously just talked about.

"Simple things, like bathroom equity," said Willis. "Problems that came up years ago and are still problems today."

to appear that they are bargaining in good faith," said Osburn. "But the fact is they've had four years to show some good faith at the table and we sure haven't seen much of it."

Arbor, which holds a contract with Pacific Gas & Electric to trim trees around powerlines in PG&E's Sierra Division, has notoriously poor working conditions.

Local 1245 is seeking to bring Arbor's wages and working conditions into line with union tree contractors so that Arbor will not have a competitive advantage in bidding on PG&E line clearance contracts.


The prevailing standard for union tree trimmers can hardly be considered extravagant. The wage scale runs from \$6.55 for groundman to \$12.84 for foreman. Employees enjoy a small pension plan with the employer contribution running at 2% of the gross wage.

Employees pick up 40% of costs for the medical plan.

"As a union we cannot in good faith negotiate contracts that undermine this very modest prevailing agreement," said union negotiator Landis Marttila.

The union continues to enjoy good support from members at other employers, including PG&E, SMUD, union tree workers, the City of Redding, and Outside Line Construction. An on-going picketline is being maintained at the Bell Road exit off Interstate-80 in Auburn.

"This is really a fight to protect wage standards for *all* of our members," said Osburn. "We welcome everyone to come walk with us on the picketline."
